

Luebner Lake

Follow a boardwalk trail to Luebner Lake for outstanding wildlife viewing opportunities. Begin your multi-day trips here at the northern end of the Glacier Discovery Trail.

Spencer Glacier

Experience the awe-inspiring power of glaciers on the landscape, Spend a few hours walking out to view the glacier and icebergs. Take a longer time and hike to the base of Spencer Glacier. Or embark on a backpacking trip into the heart of the Kenal

Bartlett Glacier

View the northern reaches of the Placer River Valley, whose beauty disguises the difficult engineering feat needed to put a railroad through the area. Hike the trail to Bartlett Glacier, the shortest hike to 'blue ice' along the Whistle Stop

Grandview

Enjoy the rich history and majestic views of this railroad outpost while hiking the Grandview Loop Trail. Trail Glacier is a four-mile hike, while Spencer Lake can be reached by following the Glacier Discovery Trail.

Trail Creek

This whistle stop connects with the Iditarod National Historic Trail. This trail was once the main transportation route used by early natives and settlers not only on the Kenal Peninsula but all the way to Nome.





Look Around

You are standing on glaciated terrain. Less than 100 years ago, this very spot was underneath Spencer Glacier. As the glacier melted and retreated over the

past century, it deposited these gravels. The Placer River worked the gravels, forming the broad outwash plain in front of the glacier and lake.
